Defining Relative Clauses

Teacher's Notes



Level: Intermediate

In this activity, students practise Defining Relative Clauses both alone and with a partner.

Aim: To practise Defining Relative Clauses through a series of written and communicative activities.

Procedure: Give each student a copy of the two-page worksheet.

Exercise A: Students begin by completing the sentences using the correct letter.

answer key:

Exercise B: Next, students complete the sentences using one of the words provided and a suitable relative pronoun.

answer key:

1. autumn, when 2. corkscrew, which/that 3. miners, who/that 4. nun, whose 5. playground, where 6. flatmate, whom

7. worms, which/that

Exercise C: Students then transform the two separate sentences into one Relative Clause sentence, using a relative pronoun.

answer key:

- 1. A gym is a place where people go to exercise.
- 2. This is the ring which/that Peter gave me.
- 3. The film stars an actor whose name I can't recall.
- 4. Don is a friend with whom I play chess. / who I play chess with.
- 5. Halloween is a day when people dress up.
- 6. Paella is a dish which/that comes from Spain.
- 7. Barbers are people who/that cut men's hair.

Exercise D: Students go on to work with a partner and (without using a dictionary) try to come up with the correct word and a suitable relative pronoun to complete the Relative Clause sentences. This can be done as a race between pairs if desired.
